

# FACKLEY TOLL-BOOK.

Some may remember the gate and chain at Fackley. There are some curious entries in the old Toll-Book. I am indebted to Mr. A. S. Buxton for the following:—From August 4th to August 17th, 1776, the gate took £15 15s. 11d., and the chain £6 3s. 2d. The Newbound miller used to pay 3d. weekly.

The tolls were farmed and there is a note to the effect that the chain was missing in 1781, "and it is said was taken away by order of the Parson, who

was concerned in farming the Toll Barr."

In reference to coal, a note says:—"There is a pitt open part got, and the colliers say there is a thousand load of coals to get out of it any time when coals is wanted."





# ELECTION OF PAROCHIAL REPRESENTATIVES ON THE RURI-DECANAL CONFERENCE.

This has hitherto been done at the Easter Vestry meeting, but at the last Diocesan Conference it was resolved that an election of lay representatives for each parish should be held within 14 days of Easter, 1907. All persons who desire their names to be placed upon the register of voters to elect representatives for this parish are requested to forward their names to me on or before the 31st day of March, 1907. Persons qualified to vote are:—

- (a) Resident Parishioners of the male sex who have been confirmed, and do not belong to any Nonconformist body.
- (B) Resident Parishioners of the female sex who have been confirmed, and who do not belong to any Nonconformist body, and who are entitled by ownership or occupation to vote at the Vestry of the Parish.


Mar. 26. Joseph Wells, Parish Clerk for more than 34 years, aged 88 years.

Joseph Wells, our Parish Clerk, died on Saturday, March 23rd. Had he lived until May he would have completed his 89th year. He was at church on the Sunday morning before his death, and was a communicant at the midday celebration. He did not leave his bed after that Sunday night, but his condition caused no serious alarm until the Friday morning following. He did not lose consciousness altogether until about six on Saturday morning, and he passed away very quietly about two in the afternoon of the same day. He officiated for the first time as Clerk on the retirement of the late John Ashmore in September, 1872, and he was soon afterwards appointed as Parish Clerk by the late Rev. G. F. Morgan. Joseph Wells was most zealous in the performance of his duties, and he set an excellent example by never being absent from Public Worship unless incapacitated by illness. And now that he is gone we cannot help feeling that there goes with him some of the "constant service of the antique world."

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





- No. 1.—Inscribed "The gift of Sir Charles Molyneux, Bart., 1758." No mark.
- No. 2.—"The gift of Sir John Molyneux." "I was new cast and added to me in 1758." Molyneux arms on the bell. Sir John died in 1691, so that the bell must be nearly 70 years older than the date inscribed.
- No. 3.—"Gloria in Excelsis Deo" ("Glory to God in the highest"). P.H. in squares surrounded by a band of cable ornament. Date, 1617.
- No. 4.—"Ex dono. Roger Grenal, armiger" (the gift of Sir Roger Grenalgh, Knight). "Obt. Septe., A.D. 1551." "Sit nome Dm Ihv Bedictu." ("Blessed be the Name of the Lord Jesus"). Henry Oldfield's bell mark.
- No. 5.—"Campana Sacra Fiat Trinitate Beata" ("Let the bell be made sacred in the Blessed Trinity"). "1683. T.W., I.C., Wardens." Molyneux arms. No bell mark.






