In an old volume of the Overseers and Churchwardens' Accounts for the parish of Teversal, there is the following entry :-

"An account of the number of persons in the parish of Teversall taken July 7th, 1811—males, 195; females, 173; total, 368.

" (Signed) ROBT. FROST." It seems, therefore, that the population of Teversal 100 years ago was about 100 less than it is at the present time. This Robert Frost was churchwarden, overseer and constable of the parish of Teversal in the year 1811. In the Constable's Account for that year is an item :-

"Numbering the people, 2s. 6d."

"Journey to Nottingham Population List, 10s."

In the same account:

"Journey to Chillwell for Coroner, 10s." "4 Men's Expenses on Inquest, 17s. 6a."
"Paid Coroner, 3s. 6d."
"Men on Inquest, 4s."

The inquest appears to have cost more than the census. It was held on the body of Thomas, son of John and Sarah Osborne, aged 8, so we learn from the Burial Register, and the verdict was, "Death by misfortune, falling into a coal pit."

In the Churchwardens' Account for the same year —

"Paid for taking lead off Church to Sutton, 7s. 6d."
"Paid the Toll Barr, 9d."

The war with France was going on then. Lead was valuable. Teversal was not the only Church stripped in those days.

In the Overseer's Account for 1811 we find: -

"Paid for load of coals, 6s."

"Carriage of ditto and bags, 2s. 6d."

"Postage from John Lee,  $10\frac{1}{2}d$ ."

This item occurs three times. It reminds us what a letter cost a hundred years ago. Again, in the same account:—
"Cheese at John Lee's Funeral, 1s. 4d."

"Bread for John Lee's Funeral, 8s."
"Ale at Funeral, 10s."
Little cheese, much bread, more ale.



Some readers have expressed themselves to have been interested in a few notes about Teversal in the year 1811, which appeared in last month's Home Words. They may, therefore, like to get an idea of how things were with Teversal people 100 years ago.

Sir F. Molyneux was living at the Manor. He died the next year, 1812. From him the estate of Teversal passed to the Lady Henrietta Howard, who

married the third Earl of Carnarvon.

The Rev. R. Rawlins had been Rector since 1792, and continued to be Rector till his death in 1828. George Reynolds was the Parish Clerk. He died in 1839, aged 93.

In the year 1811 there were eight baptisms, three marriages and eight burials. Among the burials, that of Mrs. Ann Molyneux, sister of Sir F. Molyneux.

The average prices of wheat for the year 1811, was 95s. 3d. per quarter. For the year 1810, it was 106s. 5d. And for the year 1812, 126s. 6d. Considering the high price of flour, the 8s. paid for bread at J. Lee's burial was not so extravagant an item as it appears at first sight. Those must have been hard times for poor people. There were no Poor Law Unions. Each parish relieved its own poor. Eleven Teversal parishioners were in receipt of relief in 1811.

The Overseers' account there is an item:—


Thos. Roper for Ringing, "Ale" ... ... 7s. 6d.

We do not know what the price of ale was at that time, but there should have been a good allowance for the five ringers.

There are entries in the accounts of tow and flax bought for spinning. Most

of the household linen was homespun in those days.

The names of Ashmore, Bowman, Gelsthorpe, Leverton, Taylor, Webster, Woodhead, appear in the registers of 100 years ago. Descendants from these families are living in Teversal to-day.



#### BURIAL.

#### Eliza Bower, aged 79 years.

Mrs. Bower, who died after a long and painful illness, borne with great patience, was a descendant from the Woodheads, one of the oldest Teversal families, who had lived in the parish for many generations. Mrs. Bower's recollections carried her back more than 70 years. She could remember three curates-in-charge, and four rectors of Teversal. In her early years the village band played in the Church, and she could recall how, when the hymn, or Psalm, was given out, the congregation turned round and faced the choir in the gallery.






