The Diocesan Registrar of York has sent a list of the Rectors of Teversal taken from Torres's MSS. The parish of Teversal was formerly in the Diocese of York. In the Records of the York Diocesan Registry is the following entry:—"10th June, 1745, Thomas Twells B.A., licensed curate of Teversal, Stipend £26 per annum." It must be borne in mind that money was then four or five times its present value, so that Thomas Twells' stipend would be equivalent to £120, or £130 in the present day. The then Rector of Teversal was Edward Wilson, who held the living from 1715 to 1752. He died and was buried at Bath.

The following extract is from the "Nottinghamshire Inquisitions Postmortem," published by the Thoroton Society:—

"Let inquiry be made for the King whether Leonard Turner, late of Teyvsale in County Nottingham, collier, otherwise called Leonard Dawson of Teyvsale, collier, did upon 3 February 20 Henry VII. (1504-5) at Teyvsale by force and arms, to wit with staffs and cudgels, lie in wait for a certain John Lee, and then assault and illtreat him with a pike staff, value 4d., and feloniously kill him. And whether Ralph Grenehall of Teyvsale, senior, gentleman, and John Dawson, late of Shirland in the County of Derby, chaplain, knew that the said Leonard had committed the said murder at Teyvsale, and feloniously did aid and abet on the day and year, and in the place aforesaid. In witness whereof as well as the Jurors aforesaid as the said William Pierpoint Edward Stanhop, and Ralph Agard have to this inquisition put their hand and seal, the day, year and place aforesaid."

It seems from this record that there were colliers in Teversal 400 years ago.

The County Councils' Association have also awarded a Certificate of Merit for the same work, which was sent to the Doncaster Meeting of the Royal Agricultural Society of England.


The following letter was also received from the Director of Education for Notts:—


