It will be noticed that September was the driest, and August the wettest month in the year.



THE ROLL OF HONOUR.

April 12. Pte. F. Froggatt-killed in Action in France.

Frederic Froggatt was born in Teversal on April 14th, 1896. He was baptized in the Parish Church on May 11th, 1896, and confirmed there April 10th, 1910. He joined the Army as soon as he was qualified. At the time of his death he was serving with the 15th Sherwoods. In a letter to the Rector, Capt! Graham Callow, his Commanding Officer, writes: "Pte. Froggatt was killed in action 12—4—8 whilst on patrol. He was hit by a machinegun bullet, and death was instantaneous. Please convey our very deep sympathy to his parents in their great loss. Pte. Froggatt was a plucky boy, and volunteered for the patrol he died fighting on."






