Therainfallin March was the highest of any month in the year, exceeding

by nearly an inch the total rainfall of April, May, and June.

The hottest day in the year was August 12th, on which day the maximum shade temperature was 84 degrees, and the mean temperature for the day was 70 degrees in the shade.

On May 24th the maximum shade temperature was 81 degrees. The

shade temperature reached 80 degrees on eight days in the year.

The coldest day in the year was February 10th. The mean temperature of that day was only 23 degrees, that is nine degrees below the freezing point. At 10 a.m. the thermometer registered only 22 degrees.






The total amount of collections in Church in March was £6 3s. 2d. The books of accounts are with the auditor. Items cannot, therefore, be given this month.




The rainfall on June 11th to 14th, 1.59 inches, was more than double that of the whole month of June, 1919, which was only 0.72 inches.





"In the other section of the school there is sufficient evidence that


religious instruction is treated seriously and with thoroughness.
