



The net profits of the Social Evening held on February 19th, amounting to £2 10s., have been given to J. Birkett, who broke his leg at football.




THE PAN-ANGLICAN CONGRESS.

This is a meeting of representatives of the English Church from all part of the world. It is to be held in London from Monday, June 15th, till Tuesday, June 23rd. Its object is to consider the needs of the Church in all parts of the world.

The Congress will conclude with a great Service of Thanksgiving at St Paul's Cathedral, on June 24th. At that Service a Thank-offering will be presented to Almighty God for the blessings vouchsafed to the English Church, especially in regard to its growth. Each Bishop will present the offerings collected from his Diocese. The money given is to be used for the work of the Church in the colonies or abroad. How can we in this Parish contribute towards this Thank-offering? In each house a box might be kept. Each member of the family might put a penny or twopence or more, according to his or her ability into this box, counting from the beginning of Lent, that is, from the beginning of March until the end of May. The money could then be collected and sent to the Diocesan Treasurer.

Every scholar on the books was present. The work done as a whole is praiseworthy.



CHURCH OF ENGLAND HOMES FOR WAIFS AND STRAYS.

The Matron of St. Barnabas Diocesan Home, Newark, writes:-

"Articles of clothing of all kinds, from night-gowns to petticoats, are always acceptable, but the girls particularly appreciate a few handker-chiefs, a pair of gloves, or stockings, stock collars or ties for the neck—these all being little personal treasures."

The age of the girls at the Newark Homes is from 14 upwards. If anyone is able to send anything to the Rectory, it will be forwarded there.
