
THE WEATHER IN TEVERSAL IN FEBRUARY, 1914.

Alms' Bags for the Church have been worked by Mrs. W. Parker Stamper, and Miss H. A. Tucker.






Religious Knowledge Report.

All the classes were carefully taught. In Standard II. the Repetition was a little shaky, but in everything else the work was done with thoroughness throughout the school. The hymns were sung in a pleasing manner, and pains had been taken to interpret their meaning to the scholars. The scholars showed a good knowledge of the Commandments, the Beatitudes, and the leading practical lessons embodied in the Narratives. The teachers had evidently a sympathetic interest in the truths they were teaching, and enduring results will doubtless appear in years to come.


The collections on that day were divided equally between "The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts" and "The Church Missionary Society."
