

January was the driest month in 1916, and was remarkable for its mild weather. A great contrast to January, 1917.

The total rainfall of 1915 was 31·25 inches, 3·28 inches below that of 1916. The highest maximum shade temperature was 81 degrees on July 26th, and on August 10th.

On only three days did the maximum shade temperature reach 80 degrees. It was a sunless year of low temperatures.

The lowest minimum shade temperature was 19 degrees on December 20.

The first fall of snow was on November 18th.

Report on Inspection of Religious Instruction:


The staff of this small School has the Religious interest of the scholars at heart.

Herbert Ball has been wounded in France, and is in the Base Hospital.

Lady Carnarvon has been appointed the Food Controller for the Skegby and Blackwell Rural Districts. Under her organization a Home Craft Association has been formed. Meetings are to be held in the Manor Room on every Tuesday evening at 7.
